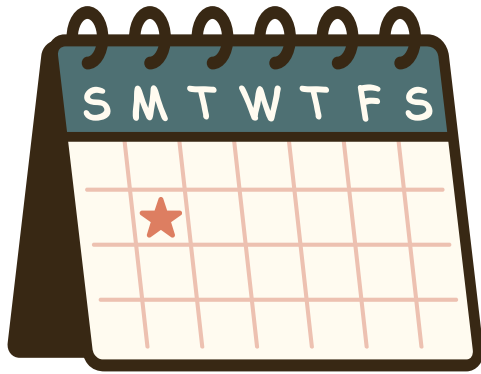

WEEK by week, the fictional matter will move forward, and (with the help of class sessions that prepare you for the task) you will tackle different aspects and various stages of advocacy – beginning at the “pitch” phase and then progressing toward a hearing.

As a part of this process, you will practice hundreds of skills, from reading into a case and evaluating priorities to working with clients, crafting short written arguments, analyzing evidence, and delivering presentations.

Your grade will be a function of (i) your participation and engagement during class this semester (15%), and (ii) your performance across a series of assignments (85%).

ABOUT GRADING

There is no exam in this class.

Instead, you will handle mock casework — ten different micro **Assignments** designed to replicate little pieces of an advocate's day job.

Just like in the real world, each Assignment is evaluated on the basis of (i) the nature of the task, and (ii) a broad range of factors, including cohesion, clarity, presentation, depth, timeliness, effectiveness, and utility.

The maximum possible score on each individual Assignment is 20 points.

Your scores will be communicated to you privately on an ongoing basis.

More info on Assignments, including the deadlines and modalities of submission, will be provided during class.

Extensions are not typically granted* — and late submissions will incur a ten-point deduction.

Group-wide feedback is shared during class; personalized reviews are available (by appt.) at Office Hours.

A**TO EXPLORE THE MANY DIMENSIONS OF ADVOCACY**

In the real world, advocacy goes beyond delivering oral arguments. Thus, this semester, we will work many types of skills (communication, problem-solving, collaborative, critical thinking, strategic, and practical).

B**TO HELP STRENGTHEN YOUR INTUITION AND INSTINCTS**

Judgment and *savoir-faire* are imperative “muscles” for an advocate. And so, in this class, one of the aims is to strengthen them (and, more broadly, grow your instincts) by mentoring you through a mix of scenarios, tasks, and exercises.

C**TO TEACH YOU ABOUT INTERNATIONAL ARBITRATION**

Even though the primary focus this semester is on advocacy, along the way, we will touch on various different aspects of international arbitration (from law and procedure to history, practice, and ethics).

D**TO EXPAND YOUR PORTFOLIO OF SAMPLE WORK PRODUCT**

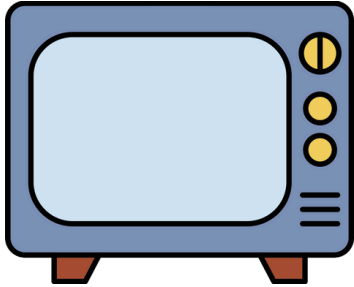
